The underpinning Vision

EucaLand

To make the agricultural landscapes of Europe, visible and invisible, both tangible and intangible, legible and accessible to a wider audience that will be able to consider and make use of them.



Background

- Cultural Landscapes are considered in the European Landscape Convention, UNESCO World Heritage Convention, other cultural landscape directives
- However there are still gaps on knowledge and inventories
 especially thinking of the Agricultural Landscapes
- People often link their identity with the agricultural landscapes; However their knowledge is limited
- Agricultural Landscapes are still seen as production places, often connected to EU-subsidies
- Agricultural Landscapes are very much endangered by the EUenlargement
- People and politicians still act isolated, while matters related to agricultural landscapes do not have any borders



History

- Idea in September 2005 at UNESCO, Paris
- 2 Workshops: Cologne 2006 (20 participants/12 countries) and Cambridge 2007 (24/17)
- 2 Meetings in 2006 (Berlin, Girona)
- Several working meetings (Cambridge, Paris, Trieste)
- Applications and Participation in calls
- 1 June 2007: Formalizing the network, common effort of BfLS and CCLP




EucaLand Goals

- Methodological approach to a common description, history, classification, assessment, planning & policy of cultural heritage in European agricultural landscapes
 - Toolkits for the description, history, classification, assessment, planning & policy of cultural aspects of European agricultural landscapes
- Dissemination of the findings (methods & toolkits) to the different groups (UNESCO, CoE, IUCN, WWF, FAO, NGO, research institutions and politicians)

Sometime in the future...

- A common classification of European Agricultural Landscapes linked with their past, present and future heritage
- Guidelines for the consideration of Agricultural Landscapes in planning processes and in policy
- "Red list" of both valuable and endangered landscapes that should be taken into account by the European countries
- Raise awareness, building capacity and providing support to the people to enable them, to be part of the process in developing their agricultural landscape



Tasks planned in the near future

- Strengthen the link between European Landscape
 Convention and UNESCO World Heritage
- Working group for the analysis of the cultural values of European agricultural landscapes
- Working group for a common classification and nomenclature of European agricultural landscape types
- Network implementation in partnership for projects and dissemination related to agricultural landscapes
- Preparing various toolkits for different users: planners, politicians, scientists, citizens



EucaLand Values

EucaLand will assist in improving awareness and understanding of the values of our agricultural landscapes on three levels:

- 1. International (UNESCO, IUCN, FAO, WWF and other international organisations),
- 2. European (Council of Europe, Ecovast)
